To continue to provide greater extra-curricular sporting opportunities for all pupils	<p>Thanks to the staff at Leckhampton, there were a fantastic number of sports and physical activity clubs on offer for all children from Years 1 to 6 during the academic year.</p> <p>Autumn – 16 different sport and physical activity clubs were run by staff and external coaches.</p> <p>Spring – 17 different sport and physical activity clubs were run by staff and external coaches.</p> <p>Summer – 16 sport and physical activity clubs were run by staff and external coaches.</p> <p>A total of 59 different sport and physical activity clubs were run over the academic year for children in Years 1 to 6.</p> <p>Active lunch clubs were run by School Sports Gloucestershire and were fully paid for by school from Sports Premium funding.</p> <p>Further to the clubs on offer, the school continued its commitment to the Cheltenham Schools Half Marathon Challenge, culminating in a final mile at the Cheltenham Half Marathon event held at the race course.</p>	£947.00

	<p>Children were given the opportunity to experience a climbing wall day. Every child in the school was able to attempt this activity on state of the art equipment with the guidance of fully trained instructors.</p> <p>A charity day was organised and hosted, which raised money for Paralympic athletes in the UK. During this, Paralympic athlete, Jack Rutter, visited the school and along with a member of Sports for Schools, held a circuit training session for every class in the school which was a great success. Mr Rutter also ran an inspiring assembly after the circuit sessions.</p> <p>Cyber Coach was again used to help the teaching of fine motor skills, balance and coordination, particularly with children with SEND.</p>	
<p>Improve the provision and teaching of P.E. by purchasing necessary equipment and resources</p>	<p>The school has an excellent variety of sports equipment that facilitates a wide range of sporting and physical activity opportunities for lessons and clubs. However, some equipment was needed to ensure that all staff were able to deliver outstanding P.E. lessons at all times.</p> <p>Some examples of the new equipment purchased include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Sports bibs • Tag rugby belts • Footballs - size 3 and size 4 • Hockey balls • Athletics field event set • Skipping ropes <p>As well as these, further equipment was purchased that gave children the opportunity to try new sports and extra-curricular clubs. <p>To increase competitive sporting opportunities for all through utilising the 'Sainsbury's School Games' and other initiatives.</p>	<p>Through the Sainsbury's Summer Games and membership of the SSN, we have been able to enter tournaments and events this year in the following sports:</p> <p>Football (District league, Albert Dix, B Team Festival & Girls' Tournament) Gymnastics Tennis Swimming Cross-country Dance Rugby District athletics Sports hall athletics Mountain biking</p> <p>As well as district and county events, the school organised four inter school sports competitions. These were: House Tug of War House Cross-Country Sports Day Wimblehampton (a new initiative, structured as a knockout competition, where children were able to compete on an individual basis for trophies, with the girls and boys finals being played in front of KS2 and staff)</p> <p>Sports Captains were again utilised. After writing a letter of application, ten children were selected for this role, with their primary responsibilities being to help organise and run House sports events, organise and tidy sports equipment and write sports reports for the school website.</p>	<p>£100.31</p>
