

Statement of Principles Guiding Leckhampton C of E Primary School's Behaviour and Discipline Policy 2019 - 2020

This statement was prepared and approved by the governing body in November 2018 following consultation with the headteacher, members of staff, parents and pupils. It is published on the school website. This statement will be reviewed every 2 years. Review due October 2020.

Statutory Guidance

These behaviour management principles are written with regard to statutory guidance from the Department for Education: Behaviour and Discipline in schools - guidance for governing bodies, July 2013 (updated September 2015)

Rationale and Purpose

This document outlines the principles on which the school's Behaviour and Discipline Policy is based. It provides guidance for the headteacher in drawing up the school's Behaviour and Discipline Policy so that it reflects the shared aspirations and beliefs of governors, staff, parents and pupils as well as taking full account of law and guidance on behaviour matters. Staff should be confident that they have the governors' support when following this guidance.

Following these principles, the headteacher sets out measures in the Behaviour Policy which aims to;

- promote good behaviour, self-discipline and respect;
- prevent bullying;
- ensure that pupils complete assigned work;
- regulate the conduct of pupils.

Principles

The governors of Leckhampton Primary School strongly believe that high standards of behaviour lie at the heart of a successful school that enables all the pupils to make the best possible progress in all aspects of their school life and all staff to be able to teach and promote good learning without undue interruption or harassment.

We believe that the highest standards of behaviour can be achieved by building strong relationships with children and families and having constant regard for the dignity and worth of each individual.

Our Behaviour and Discipline is founded on four key principles:

- Visible Kindness
- Visible Consistency
- Deliberate Care
- Never Giving up on Any Child

These relate to our school values: Responsibility; Compassion; Respect and Perseverance.

All behaviour management is guided by our motto: 'Open Hearts, Open Minds, Open Doors' and by the school rules: 'Be kind, be respectful, be the best you can be.'

All positive and corrective interactions about behaviour are framed by these.

Parents/carers are encouraged and helped to support their children's education and the standard of behaviour expected of all pupils is included in the school's Home School Agreement which parents are asked to sign following their child's admission to school.

Good behaviour is consistently recognised, with first attention going to those doing the right thing, and rewarded as appropriate. The range of rewards available is outlined in the Behaviour Policy.

Poor behaviour is consistently and calmly addressed, and a range of available sanctions applied as appropriate which are clearly described in the Behaviour Policy. Where children's emotional and developmental needs mean that they need more support there is a clear process for implementing Individual Behaviour plans and working closely with families.

Where necessary the school will work with other local agencies to assess the needs of pupils where behaviour would benefit from outside professional input.

Safeguarding

- The Behaviour and Discipline Policy safeguards and promotes the welfare of children.
- The school's Child Protection Policy and Safeguarding Procedures will be followed where staff consider that misbehaviour may be linked to the child suffering, or being likely to suffer, significant harm.
- As part of Leckhampton C of E Primary School's ongoing safeguarding and child protection duties, we are duty bound to support the Government's Prevent Strategy.

Equality

Leckhampton Primary School is an inclusive school. We aim to create a learning environment where children feel able to be themselves and understand that no one should be bullied for being different. All members of the school community should be free from discrimination of any sort.

The school has a clear and comprehensive Anti-bullying Policy. The Behaviour Policy acknowledges the school's legal duties under the [Equality Act 2010](#), including in respect of safeguarding and in respect of pupils with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND).

School staff

- Staff and volunteers are expected to be good role models.
- It is the responsibility of all school staff to follow the Behaviour Policy with all pupils whom they are in contact with in school.
- Staff have the right to undertake their duties free from verbal or physical harm.
- Governors expect pupils and parents to treat staff with courtesy and respect at all times.
- The advice in the Department of Education Guidance: Dealing with Allegations of Abuse against Teachers and Other Staff would be followed in the event of an accusation of misconduct against a staff member.
- In the event that a malicious accusation was made against a member of school staff the Behaviour Policy would be followed when managing the pupil involved.

Discipline Beyond the School Gates

The school's Behaviour Policy covers the power to discipline beyond the school gate, including the school's response to:

misbehaviour when the pupil is:

- taking part in any school-organised or school-related activity or
- travelling to or from school or
- wearing school uniform or
- in some other way identifiable as a pupil at the school.

or misbehaviour at any time, whether or not the conditions above apply, that:

- could have repercussions for the orderly running of the school or
- poses a threat to another pupil or member of the public or
- could adversely affect the reputation of the school.

Screening and searching pupils

The school's Behaviour Policy on screening and searching pupils is in line with the Department of Education Guidance: Searching, screening and confiscation - Advice for headteachers, school staff and governing bodies.

The power to use reasonable force and other physical contact

The school's Behaviour Policy on the use of reasonable force and other physical contact is in line with Department of Education Guidance: Use of reasonable force - Advice for headteachers, school staff and governing bodies.
